

Official observer status at the United Nations



IUCN World Conservation Congress

- Over 10,000 participants in 2016
- **121 Resolutions**, Recommendations and other Decisions
- Adopted the Hawai'i Commitments to address current and imminent challenges
- New science, partnerships and commitments for action
- 21,000 news articles, 75 million reached on social media
- Raised the bar for hosting sustainable events

Identifying needs, providing solutions

- 1948 Created to address absence of effective international agencies dedicated to nature
- Early focus human impacts on nature, then species and habitat protection
- 1980s broadened scope to include human rights, economics and sustainable development
- 2000s developed and applied the concept of naturebased solutions to global challenges



 Synthetic biology, biodiversity offsets, undersea mining, urban conservation etc.




